Gaya is located 100 kilometers away from the capital city of Patna. Historically, Gaya was the part of the ancient Magadh Empire located on the bank of Falgu River and is considered among one of the most sacred cities for Hindus. Three hills Mangala-Gauri, Ram-Shila and Brahmayoni surround it from three sides and make it a beautiful site. The old temple of Vishnupad has holy footprints of Lord Vishnu.

Bodhgaya is one of the most important and sacred Buddhist pilgrimage center in the world. It was here under a Peepal Tree, the Bodhi Tree, Gautama attained supreme knowledge to become Buddha, the Enlightened One. Significantly, the state's name of 'Bihar' originated from 'Vihara' meaning monasteries which abounded in Bihar.

There are several places of tourist importance like Mahabodhi Temple, Animesh Lochan Chaitya, Bodhi Tree, Chankramana, Ratnagarh, Buddha, Lotus Tank, Buddha Kund, Rajayatana, Brahm Yoni, Chinese Temple & Monastery, Burmese Temple, Buddhist Monastery of Bhutan, International Buddhist House & Japanese Temple, Thai Temple & Monastery, Tibetan Monastery, Archaeological Museum. Sujata village (2 kms), Dungeshwari Temple (Pragbodhi Hill) (22 kms by road), Maitraya Project (3 kms), 80 ft Statue of the Buddha, Baba Koteshwarnath

Temple and Gurupa Hills.





Festival of Colours

Holi is an ancient Hindu tradition and also one of the most popular festivals in Hinduism also celebrates the eternal and divine love of Radha Krishna. The day also signifies the triumph of good over evil, as it commemorates the victory of Lord Vishnu as Narasimha Narayana over Hiranyakashipu.

Holi

Holi celebrates the arrival of spring, the end of winter, the blossoming of love and for many, it is a festive day to meet others, play and laugh, forget and forgive, and repair broken relationships. The festival is also an invocation for a good spring harvest season.

Holi celebrations start on the night before Holi with a Holika Dahan where people gather, perform religious rituals. The next morning is celebrated as Rangwali Holi (Dhuleti) where people smear and drench each other with colours. Groups often carry drums and other musical instruments going from place to place singing and dancing. Throughout the day people visit family, and friends come together to chat, enjoy food and drink, and partake in Holi delicacies.

The festival has many purposes; most prominently, it celebrates the beginning of Spring. It is identified as a festival that celebrates agriculture, commemorates good spring harvests and the fertile land.

Traditionally, washable natural plant-derived colours such as turmeric, neem, dhak, and kumkum were used, but water-based commercial pigments are increasingly used nowadays. This is why Holi is given the name "Festival of Colours". Later in the day, after a day of play with colours, people clean up, wash and bathe, sober up and dress up in the evening and greet friends and relatives by visiting them and exchanging sweets. Groups sing and dance, some playing drums and dholak. After each stop of fun and play with colours, people offer gujiya, mathri, malpuas and other traditional delicacies.

Holi is known as Phaguwa in the local Bhojpuri dialect. On the eve of Phalgun Poornima, people light bonfires. They put dried cow dung cakes, wood of the Araad or Redi tree and Holika tree, grains from the fresh harvest and unwanted wood leaves in

the bonfire. The eldest member of the gathering or a purohit initiates the lighting. He then smears others with colour as a mark of greeting. Next day the festival is celebrated with colours and a lot of frolic. Holi Milan is also observed in Bihar, where family members and well-wishers visit each other's family, apply colours (abeer) on each other's faces, and on feet, if elderly. Though the festival is usually celebrated with colours, in some places, people also enjoy celebrating Holi with water solutions of mud or clay. Folk songs are sung at high pitch and people dance to the sound, intoxicating bhang, made from cannabis, milk and spices, is consumed with a variety of mouth-watering delicacies, such as pakoras and thandai, to enhance the mood of the festival. The fun and frolic of Holi is unmatched. Holi celebrates love, forgiveness, and triumph of good over evil.

Republic Day, in India, celebrated annually is a commemoration of the adoption of the constitution of India on January 26, 1950. A draft of Constitution was submitted in November to the Constituent Assembly, which debated and adjusted the text over the following two years. January 26 was selected as the date of the constitution's promulgation in recognition of the Purna Swaraj resolution, a call for India's complete independence adopted by the Indian National Congress on January 26, 1930. India achieved independence from the British Raj on 15 August 1947 through the Indian Independence Act 1947, an Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom that partitioned British India into the two new independent Dominions of the British Commonwealth

The main Republic Day is a National holiday and ceremonial parades take place on the Rajpath, which is performed as a tribute to India; its unity in diversity and rich cultural heritage. The President of India; who is the Commander-in-Chief of the Indian Armed Forces, takes the salute.

Republic 26 January

The first Cabinet of Bihar was formed on 2 April 1946, consisting of two members, Dr. Sri Krishna Sinha as the first Chief Minister of Bihar and Dr. Anugrah Narayan Sinha as Deputy Chief Minister and Finance Minister of Bihar. The Cabinet served as the first Bihar Government after independence in 1947. Bihar became a constituent part, and in 1948 the small states with capitals at Saraikela and Kharsawan were merged with it. In 1956, the Indian states were reorganized on a linguistic basis and Bihar was transferred to West Bengal. On 22nd March 1912 promulgation Bihar was carved from Bengal and later Orissa was carved out of Bihar. The constitution, one of the longest and most detailed in the world, established India as a democratic republic and a union of states.

Sant Rayidas Jayanti

Guru Ravidas is revered due to his spirituality and works against casteism. He was a spiritual man. Guru Ravidas' birth is celebrated as Ravidas Jayanti. "Guru Ravidass Jayanti" is the birthday of Guru Ravidas, celebrated on Magh Purnima, the full moon day.

On this day, his followers bathe in the holy rivers. Then, they take inspiration from their Guru Ravidas Ji by remembering the great events and miracles related to his life. His devotees go to his place of birth and celebrate his birthday on Ravidas Jayanti. It is the annual focal point for the Sikhism Ravidassia religion. People across countries celebrate this special occasion. Devotees take a holy dip in the river to perform rites. The 2020 date for the Jayanti was February 9, and the 2021 date was February 16.

Ravidas or Raidas was an Indian mystic poet-saint of the Bhakti movement during the 15th to 16th century CE. Venerated as a guru (teacher) in the modern regions of Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Punjab, and Haryana, he was a poet, social reformer and spiritual figure. He is known as a spiritual man and also as a social reformer because of his work against casteism. He taught removal of social divisions of caste and gender, and promoted unity in the pursuit of personal spiritual freedom.

He was contemporary to saint Kabir. Ravidas Ji was born in the village Seer Goverdhanpur. He was contemporary to Kabir Ji, and has a number of recorded interactions with Kabir Ji on spirituality.

Ravidas Ji is well-known for making efforts in eradicating caste system. He has also contributed to the Bhakti movement, and is wellrecognized as a good friend and disciple of Kabir Ji. Mirabai was his

disciple. Ravidas Jayanti has a special significance among the people following Ravidassia religion, that follows Ravidas Ji only, and other people who in any way revere Ravidas Ji like some of the Kabirpanthis, Sikhs, and other gurus. Ravidas's devotional verses were included in the Sikh scriptures known as Guru Granth Sahib. The Panch Vani text of the Dadu Panthi tradition within Hinduism also includes numerous poems of Ravidas.

His ideas and fame grew over his lifetime, and texts suggest Brahmins used to bow before him. He travelled extensively, visiting Hindu pilgrimage sites in Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Gujarat, Rajasthan, and those in the Himalayas. He abandoned "saguna" forms of supreme beings, and focused on the "nirguna" form of supreme beings. As his poetic hymns in regional languages inspired others, people from various background sought his teachings and guidance.
